Shade the Trails Commemorative Plaque

It all started in May of 2015 when I was walking with my 90-year-old mother at Crowley Park and noticed that there were no trees along the trail around the park. It was warm and I remember thinking, what is this going to be like in July and August and wouldn't it be more tolerable to be

walking in shade? So, that was the beginning of Shade the Trail. I met with our neighborhood association, CPNA, and they were very supportive of me starting the program. I then worked with the city and acquired a Matching Beautification Grant which matched dollar for dollar what our neighborhood contributed. It gave residents in our neighborhood the opportunity to buy a large tree "in memory of" or "in honor of" someone they loved. I can't tell you how appreciative I am of all of our neighbors who collectively donated



more than \$15,000 to the program and especially to those who donated more than 1 tree.

We planted Texas native trees that were approved by the city and I worked closely with our Richardson Parks department on the locations. We planted only in the spring and fall. The parks department bought the trees, planted the trees in the agreed upon location and kept the trees watered. Most of the trees along the trail have a bubbler system which keeps them watered and

healthy, especially during our very hot summers. In total throughout the years to date we have planted over 100 additional trees around the park, mainly along the trail but also within the park and along the tree line. The large trees are Shumard Red Oaks, Burr Oaks, Chinquapin Oaks, and Cedar Elms. The smaller trees are Dogwoods, Mexican Plums, and mainly Redbuds. In years to come the trees along the trail will grow large and proud and provide wonderful shade for the trail around the park and the redbuds and other flowering trees along the tree line will dot our park with spectacular color in the spring.



All of us who live in this wonderful Crowley Park neighborhood should be able to enjoy our trail around the park - joggers, walkers, the elderly, the young and our furry friends as well. It is

so much more inviting to exercise and use the trails when they are shaded and thus more tolerable in our hot weather. Shade the Trail also leaves a legacy for those who come after us. It takes 30 years for a tree to grow to maturity and some of us may not be in this neighborhood by then. To honor our Crowley Park donors and our parks department, there is now a Shade the Trail plaque located at the corner of Honeysuckle and Blackberry, a corner that was transformed by the trees added at that location. It is meant to blend into the natural landscape and be a light touch, to thank all those who contributed and supported this program. Crime Watch

Area police agencies have received recent reports of bank customers' vehicles being burglarized, again. This is a crime trend that comes and goes and seems to be on the rise. The suspects in these cases will stake out a bank and watch for customers leaving the bank. The customers are then followed to their next destination. If the customer is not seen carrying the bank bag/envelope from their vehicle, the suspects will then move in and break into the vehicle in search of the money.

Please be very alert to your surroundings when making a deposit or withdrawing cash from a bank. Check frequently to make sure you are not being followed. I have listed some ideas below to help detect on whether you are being followed:

- while traveling to or from a bank, safely make left-hand turns or U-turns and watch to see if another vehicle is following your movements. Keep in mind that some of these offenders operate using more than one vehicle.
- When pulling into a gas station, fast food establishment etc. wait to see if another car follows you in, or just pull into a parking lot and safely go right back out.
- Checking tires for damage since some offenders will damage your tires while you are in the bank causing you to have to pull over when the tire goes flat, thus providing them the opportunity to get to your money.
- never leaving money in your vehicle unattended.
- If in a robbery situation, comply with the robbers demands and do not resist.

If you feel you are being followed or see something suspicious contact police immediately by calling 911.

The market is strong and inventory is low.

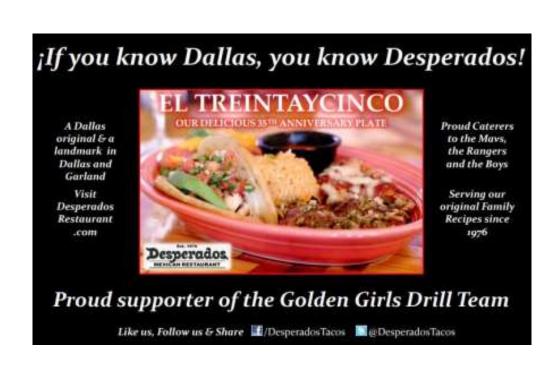
